








Community Engagement Framework

- Reflect on your role as a community partner
- Research the community where you are working
- Partner with other organizations to build community relationships
- **Plan** thoughtful, culturally-responsive community engagement experiences
- **Implement** your community engagement experiences and events
- **Sustain** your community engagement beyond a single event or initiative



Partnering with School Districts

- Show importance of Safe Routes to School
- Increase program buy-in
- Influence plans and policies
- Co-develop transportation solutions
- Streamline messaging
- Increase resources staff, materials, equipment, communications

- Serving on a transportation advisory board
- Developing bike education curriculum
- Funding bike equipment
- Creating cross-promotional materials
- Shared used agreements

- Show support from parent/caregivers, students, school staff, community members
- Show example from other communities
- Invite to an upcoming event
- Start small




Present Safe Routes to School as a Solution

- Transportation costs
- Bus shortage
- Car congestion
- Lack of student physical activity
- Mental health struggles
- Tardiness/absenteeism
- Poor or inadequate infrastructure



Potential Barriers

- Little interest in Safe Routes to School
- Safe Routes to School is a liability concern
- Poor experience with Safe Routes to School in the past
- Too much red tape
- Other priorities take precedent



Look for Opportunities to Get Involved

- Redistricting
- School consolidations/closures
- New school openings
- Traffic safety incidents involving students
- Vision Zero initiatives
- Curriculum planning

- Supports SRTS student contests




Albuquerque Public Schools (APS) Vision Zero Task Force


