


Community Engagement Framework

- **Reflect** on your role as a community partner

- **Plan** thoughtful, culturally-responsive community engagement experiences
- **Implement** your community engagement experiences and events
- **Sustain** your community engagement beyond a single event or initiative






The 6 E's of Safe Routes to School



All Safe Routes to School initiatives should begin by listening to students, families, teachers, and school leaders and working with existing community organizations, and build intentional, ongoing engagement opportunities into the program structure.

Using History and Art in Safe Routes Programs

- Creates a sense of place
- Celebrates local culture, heritage, and traditions
- Increases community connectedness
- Provides an accessible entry point to program participation
- Engages new audiences



Examples of Projects

- Wayfinding and signage
- Wall or street murals
- Safe Routes maps
- StoryWalk® installations
- Vision boards
- Artistic crosswalks



Fort Collins Asphalt Art

- \$25,000 grant from Bloomberg Philanthropies
- Street mural + infrastructure improvements
 - Slow vehicle speeds
 - Shorten pedestrian crossing distances
 - Reduce conflicts between vehicles and road users
- Designed by local artists, painted by volunteers




Asphalt Art Mural – Fort Collins, Colorado

- Tip: Celebrate a local hero in your next Walk/Bike and Roll to School Day event




